


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

### GENE NANCE MOVED TO

the Willo neighborhood in 1947 and has lived at 112 W. Palm Lane since then. He has seen many changes over the years but loves living in Willo because of the wonderful friendly neighbors and charming homes.

Born in Albuquerque, NM on May 23rd, 1933, Gene moved to Phoenix in 1942 with his parents. His father Horace, a dentist, soon moved back to Albuquerque leav-

ing Gene and his mother, Elizabeth. Elizabeth wanted the best schools for Gene and purchased their home in Willo so he could attend Kenilworth. The population of Phoenix was around 100,000 at that time.

After Kenilworth, Gene attended North High. He was secretary/treasurer, home room officer and participated in the debate club. He graduated in 1951.

### **GENE 1951**

Following high school, Gene attended Phoenix College for two years working toward a career in Business Administration. He also enjoyed photography, music, golf, tennis and swimming while attending PC.

### 1953 TO 1955

From 1953 to 1955 Gene attended Arizona State University earning a degree in Radio Physics and Marketing. After two years in the Army, he returned to Phoenix and worked with the Radio Corporation of America, Montgomery Wards, and Osco Drugs. He retired in 1975.

### **GENE TODAY**

Gene keeps busy by going to aerobics every morning dividing his time between the Downtown YMCA and the Chris Town YMCA. He spends the rest of his day serv-

ing food to "people older than me" at the Senior Center on Filmore.

Gene has been on the Willo Board for over 20 years. He is in charge of historic property renewals and is a notary for the neighborhood. Though he does

own and drive a car, he will usually be seen riding his bicycle around the neighborhood.

He has traveled extensively in Europe, Japan, Thailand, Hong Kong, Mexico, Canada, and Germany. Every year Gene enjoys a two week vacation in Hawaii to visit friends.

Stop by for a visit in the late afternoons and you will see Gene sipping a glass of wine on his porch enjoying a large flock of peach-faced love birds in his palm trees. 




# HEAT RELIEF CAMPAIGN

# ADISCOVER AMERICA'S HIDDEN GEMS



### MAY IS NATIONAL

Preservation Month and in keeping with the theme—"Discover America's Hidden Gems"—past and present, the Phoenix Historic Preservation Commissioners will share their favorite Phoenix memories and "hidden gems" at a celebration, Tuesday, May 29th at 6:30 pm, at the Encanto Clubhouse, 2605 N.15th Ave.

The city's Historic Preservation Commission is made up of nine Phoenix residents, representing categories such as registered architect, real estate professional, archeologist, and historian and serve for a three-year terms.

Phoenix also has a team of professionals, led by Michelle Dodd that run the City's Historic Preservation Office. Their focus is to protect and enhance historic neighborhoods, buildings, and sites in Phoenix. They work closely with the Phoenix Historic Preservation Commission, to identify designate districts and properties that are eligible for a listing on the Phoenix Historic Property Register. The Preservation Office also produces interesting books, like the coffee-table book "Midcentury Marvels: Commercial Architecture of Phoenix, 1945 -1975" co-written by The Phoenix Historic Preservation Office and Ryden Architecture, Inc.

To qualify as a Historic Property in Phoenix, a property has to be at least 50 years old or have achieved an exceptional level of significance in the past 50 years. "Significance" can mean one or more of these things: that the property is connected to events have contributed to wide patterns in the Phoenix history; that it is associated with significant people from Phoenix history; that it has, or is likely to in the future, provide information that will be helpful to increasing our understanding of Phoenix history or pre-history; and/or that the construction of the property clearly represents a specific type, period, or method; or it represents the work of an artistic master.

Also working to save our historic sites is the Arizona Preservation Foundation. Since 1979, the Foundation has worked with local, state, and national partners to promote and protect Arizona's historic resources. For more information visit, azpreservation.org and Facebook/azpreservation.

### *In Other "Historic" News:*

**LAST MONTH,** the Associated Press reported that in an effort to stop the demolition of our neighboring state fairgrounds, the Phoenix City Council awarded a historic preservation grant worth \$120,000 to help repair the WPA Administration Building at the fairgrounds. Another \$80,000 was awarded by the Phoenix IDA, a provider of private activity bonds for projects that give a public benefit.

Originally the building was set for demolition in July 2014 but the Maricopa County Superior Court issued a temporary restraining order. The Arizona Exhibition and State Fair Board had planned to demolish the building unless the preservation

community could raise at least \$120,000 by April 14. Considered an iconic landmark at the fairgrounds, the 12,200-square-foot property was built in 1938.

**NEW SPOT IN OLD, HISTORIC** building. "Nook Kitchen Downtown" is now open in the recently-renovated 1931 Professional Building (aka Hilton Garden Inn Phoenix Downtown) in downtown Phoenix. The swanky, new restaurant and bar feature art deco aesthetics, boasting 19-foot-high floor-to-ceiling windows and an impressive octagonal marble bar.

"It's comfortable, but upscale – hip but not pretentious," said owner Frank Vairo.

Located at 15 E. Monroe Street across from Valley Bar and Seamus McCaffrey's, Nook is the "anchor restaurant" to the newly restored hotel that that opened December 2015.

ALEXANDRA DEE MELIKIAN, a junior at Phoenix Country Day School, has created a deck of playing cards featuring historic landmarks in her hometown and Arizona's capital city, Phoenix. Each playing card and the two Joker cards feature an original color photograph of one of 54 historic landmarks in the city of Phoenix. The cards also feature the building's name, address, and date of construction. The retail price is \$10 with five percent of the proceeds donated to the Arizona Preservation Foundation. # THINKING& LEARNING ALL SUMMER LONG

### IT IS IMPORTANT TO KEEP

children thinking and learning all summer long to help retain all the great knowledge and skills they have gained during the school year. Those who stay engaged throughout the summer months are better prepared for re-entry into school in August.

The obvious opportunity for keeping children engaged is to keep them reading every day. For reluctant readers this is not an easy task. However, you can make it fun if it becomes a family activity. You might set aside fifteen to thirty minutes to read together or each read on your own. Then, taking time to share what you are reading and discuss the characters, plot or activities taking place in the book can make it more educational and fun for your child. It is especially fun for children to compare what they are reading to a movie they have seen or create a new ending to the book. Make it fun! And, sometimes reading on the computer or a digital tablet is more enjoyable for children today.

Comic books are an engaging and educational way to integrate art and reading. Researching the artists or creating their own art and comics engages children at an entirely new level.

Ask yourself, what could I learn from my child? This might be a fun and interesting way to engage your child in learning. Is there something they can do on the computer that you can't? Did they learn any coding at school this year if attending



Kenilworth School or learn games on the computer they can teach you? Taking time out to learn from your child is a great way to involve them in dialogue and engage their critical thinking skills.

Consider playing Words with Friends with your child or other digital or paper

word or numbers games. Even the youngest of children can intuitively download these games to play on a smart phone or tablet.

If you have the resources to send your child to camp or purchase inexpensive online classes that are aligned with your child's interests, they can be great learning opportunities. For example, children can learn computer coding at scratch.mit.edu, code.org or studiocode.org and e-learning-forkids.org offers numerous learning opportunities. Some of their courses can even be downloaded at no cost if you do not have Internet access. And, there are many opportunities to learn languages online.

Don't forget our public libraries. They are an amazing source of learning for children and adults of all ages. Visit phoenix-publiclibrary.org for the library nearest you.

Just about any activity you are involved in can be turned into a learning opportunity through dialogue with your children. Consider the math, language, spelling or science embedded in our everyday living and make learning fun as you engage with your child.

Dear Willo Residents,

On behalf of Boxer Luv Rescue, I wanted to thank you for allowing us to receive your unsold donations following your Community Yard Sale.

Founded in 1998, Boxer Luv Rescue (BLR) is a 501 (c)(3) organization dedicated to giving new life to homeless Boxers and Boxer mixes in need in the Metro Phoenix area and throughout Arizona. We have documented more than 7,000 rescues since 1998.

Boxer Luv works closely with county shelters - 90% of Boxers rescued are abandoned, injured, sick, lost and unwanted Boxers that end up on shelter kill lists. We are saving between 450-650 Boxers and Boxer mixes annually in Arizona - we rescued and cared for 519 Boxers in 2015.

Boxer Luv is an all-volunteer organization that operates solely on private donations and grants from individuals and corporations. The vast majority of dogs in BLR are rehabilitated in foster homes where they are medically treated, and given time to heal from their physical and emotional wounds before being ready for adoption to qualified families and individuals. If foster homes are not available, the healthiest dogs are boarded at a private kennel where they are exercised and cared for by Boxer Luv Volunteers.

In 2013, Boxer Luv made the leap of faith and opened a thrift shop at 12<sup>th</sup> St and Northern Ave (1221 E Northern Ave, Phoenix, 85020), Luv-To-Save. As with the rest of BLR's operations, it is volunteer run and relies on public donations for our goods to sell. All of the items received from the Willo Yard Sale were taken to our shop for sale. If you are missing something, or just need something great at amazing prices, please come have a look!

Our shop is open Tuesday-Friday, 11am-4pm and Saturdays from 10am-5pm. As a thank you for your generous support, we are offering Willo residents 20% off your purchase (minimum \$5), through the end of June. Just show this letter for your discount.


