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



he new Vernon Avenue Pocket Park next door to Shine Coffee is open! Mayor Stanton, David Anaya of Phoenix Renews & Colin Tetrault of ASU's School of Sustainability joined Willo neighbors to cut the ribbon on this new space on Vernon Avenue, just west of Central Avenue. Thanks to an effort

led by Shine Coffee owners Christiaan & Laryn Blok, a successful Kickstarter campaign raised over \$23,000 in community dona-

tions to for landscape, trees, watering system and grass. Thanks to landscape architect Kirby Hoyt who donated the design which was implemented by Paradise Valley Tree Experts/Property Maintenance.

Neighbors and coffee drinkers have been anxiously watching the park being built over the past few months and were all in attendance to toast the new space (with coffee of course!). Future plans for the park include working with ASU architecture students on creating custom park benches and adding architectural lighting.

ENCANTO PARK PARK IMPROVEMENTS

Below is a summary of some of the projects that are currently underway at Encanto Park.

Sports Complex

◆ The Sports Complex has been opened for use.

• New fabric will be ordered to replace the existing windscreens.

• Work to remedy the lighting issues is still being conducted. The manufacturer of the light fixtures met City representatives at night to better understand the issue. A shield plate is being fabricated to minimize the glare.

Perimeter Fence Project

• The areas with retaining walls along Thomas Road are next to be repaired. The contractor will be repairing the damaged block, replacing the 2' high fence, and repainting the wall.

Picnic Areas

• The ramada plans are 100% complete, permitted and work is underway.

Lake Improvements

◆ Pump is complete, inspected and it is working as designed.

Playgrounds

◆ The playground has been ordered and



usually takes 6 to 8 weeks to fabricate.

◆ The City has developed an aquatic theme for the playground on the Encanto side of the park.

• Wood fiber was installed at the playgrounds.

◆ A community meeting was held to select the exercise equipment. The items selected will be installed in the area just east of the existing pool. The improvements will include five pieces of exercise equipment; as well as a shaded seating area.



Additional projects as funding permits are: parking lot improvement, lagoon dredging, lighting, clubhouse renovation, irrigation improvements, and sports field improvements.

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

GREEN BIKES COMING TO PHOENIX

ave you seen them? Neon green bikes are starting to be seen around downtown as part of a new bikesharing program that

will officially launch this Spring. The Gr:D (pronounced Grid) bikes are not available to the public just yet, but are being used by 20 testers - CycleHope employees (vendor of the bikes) and City staff who will use the bike sharing system like typical customers in preparation for the public launch. They'll use a mobile device to book the bike online or rent from the bike itself and return the bicycles to one of three temporary bike racks in downtown Phoenix. After the launch, people can rent bikes from \$5 an hour, \$30 a month or \$79 a year, with a discount for students. The bikes have GPS so the company can track their locations. And to cut down on theft, some parts, like the handlebars, are built into the frame and can't be removed. The City said that no City funds will be used for

the program, but the contract allows for revenue sharing of profits once they reach a certain level.

You might also notice new bike lanes popping up downtown as well. A new lane is being used along Van Buren around Grand Avenue East.

Future steps allow for the bike share program to expand into Tempe and Mesa. W

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dog, but no time to take one for daily walks and weekend outings?

If so, consider adopting a desert tortoise through the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Tortoise Adoption Program. The Program was established in 1981, and is conducted in partnership with the Phoenix Herpetological Society and the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum in Tucson.

Desert tortoises are protected in Arizona and cannot be legally collected from the wild, but breeding of captive tortoises and the return of tortoises by owners who can no longer care for them has led to a surplus of these unique animals at authorized adoption facilities. The facilities are at capacity and are seeking people willing to adopt and care for a tortoise.

"The Game and Fish Department receives hundreds of unwanted adult and captive-born tortoises each year, and caring for these animals takes away resources for conservation efforts of wild tortoises," says Cristina Jones, Arizona Game and Fish turtle biologist. "That is one reason we discourage captive breeding and only allow adoption of one tortoise or multiple tortoises of the same sex per household."

Contrary to many initial assumptions, desert tortoises can be interactive and provide companionship without as many demands as a cat or dog. Tortoises can teach many of the same life lessons to children, including responsibility, compassion and commitment.

Desert tortoises can live as long as 50 to 100 years. They grow to be about 15 pounds and hibernate in the winter months. They eat plant material, including grasses and wildflowers.

To adopt a desert tortoise, you will need to have an enclosed area in your yard free from potential hazards, such as an overly curious dog or an unfenced pool. You will need to construct a burrow for the tortoise so that it can get relief from extreme temperatures. Those interested in sharing their yard with a tortoise should visit www.azgfd.gov/tortoise for more information on feeding, care and habitat for a tortoise.




