

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
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Operation Santa Clause

you that gave cash...What a blessing you were to many people!


DOG FOOD WANTED AND NEEDED!

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
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Willo Toasts Neighbors on Tour!

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
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
Ingredients

- ◆ 2 cups water
- ◆ 1 cup sugar
- ◆ 1 12-oz package fresh cranberries
- ◆ 3 cups vodka

Directions

1. Combine sugar and water, cook over medium heat 5 minutes or until sugar dissolves, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and cool completely.
2. Place cranberries in food processor, process 2 minutes or until finely chopped. Combine sugar water and cranberries in a large bowl, stir in vodka.
3. Pour vodka mixture into clean jars, secure with lids. Let stand 3 weeks in a cool dark place shaking every other day.
4. Strain the cranberry mix through a cheesecloth - lined sieve into a bowl, discard solids. Carefully pour liqueur into clean bottles or jars.

Yield 4 ½ cups. Can be stored refrigerated or at room temp for up to 1 year 



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
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
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The WPA's Legacy in Willo

The next time you are strolling through the neighborhood, look down — you may be walking on a piece of history. If you're lucky you may see a stamp that reads "WPA" and a date. The WPA, or the Works Progress Administration (later known as the Works Projects Administration) was formed in 1935 by President Roosevelt and funded by Congress to put Americans back to work after

the Depression. It operated for 8 years and provided temporary employment for millions of people. There is hardly a town in America that does not have WPA-built library, bridge, sidewalk, or some other public works project. In Phoenix the WPA built Encanto, Grant and Coronado Parks, Papago Park and the ramadas at South Mountain Park. The building that houses the Arizona Museum of Natural History in Mesa was built in 1937 by the WPA and WPA stamps can be seen in the retaining walls around the lake at Steele Indian School Park. The city saved them

when they transformed the old Indian School grounds into the park.

In Willo the WPA built many of our sidewalks, curbs and driveways. One great place to see them is the 500 block of Lewis, where WPA stamps from 1939 and 1940 adorn just about every square foot of concrete. The stamp pictured here dates to the early years of the WPA and was found on 3rd avenue north of Vernon. Willo residents can be proud of this bit of American history — so keep looking down and see what history you find.


wants a relaxed host, not a frantic mess. If you are enjoying yourself, I guarantee they will follow suit.

Loraine Knowles, 89, passed to the next world on November 21. She was born in Hoisington, KS, to Bertha (Sizemore) and Carl Ovid Hurt on November 11, 1924, and raised in Kansas City, MO, where she graduated from Westport High School at age 15. She married Frank Branham with whom she had one child, Nancy.

Loraine was undaunted by the chronic respiratory disease that dogged her forever. Raised in severe poverty, she was intellectually gifted and had an adventurous spirit. An avid reader and essentially self-educated, she was interested in everything and everyone. Loraine's heart knew no borders and she was truly a spiritual citizen of the world.

In 1958, seeking a healthier location, she came to Phoenix with her young daughter. She adopted her new home with characteristic enthusiasm and built a new life. She was an executive secretary for HC Beck Contractors until her retirement. In 1969 she married Earle Knowles. They created a lovely home in Willo, traveled internationally, served in numerous community organizations, participated in Shriner events, attended jazz festivals, and opened the world to their adored granddaughter.

Loraine and her family were one of Willo's original owners, and served as a longtime member of the board of the Willo Neighborhood Association, member of the Willo Home Tour committee and copy editor of its newsletter, and a trustee and deacon of Encanto Community Church. Both

of these communities offered treasured relationships, including the many friends who helped tend her in her last days. But "Loraine's Bar" was always the focus of every party!

son-in-law David Songer of Roseville, MN; stepson Todd Knowles of Phoenix; granddaughter Kate Songer, grandson-in-law Bernard Johnson and precious grandchildren Nuri, Lua and Martha Raine of Reston, VA. She was predeceased by her husband Earle Knowles, former husband Frank Branham, and his siblings, whom she loved as her own.

Loraine was loved and will be sorely missed by so many Willo neighbors – young and old- but we will keep her close through our special memories.

Historic Home Grants...

It's the time of year to start thinking about applying for an Exterior Rehabilitation Grant from the city of Phoenix Historic Preservation Office. The Exterior Rehabilitation Program provides funding for repair and restoration work on historic homes. Owners of properties located in city-designated historic districts or individually listed on the city's historic property register are eligible to apply.

The program reimburses owners 50/50 for pre-approved work with grant funding between \$5,000 and \$10,000. In exchange for the grant, the property owner agrees to a 15-year conservation easement to protect the historic character of the property's exteriors.

A successful project is one that retains and preserves as much of the original historic fabric as possible while maintaining the historic, character-defining architectural elements of the home.

Eligible projects include items such as foundation repair, brick repointing, stucco repair, structural rehabilitation, removal of non-historic additions, historic window repair, and roofing repair/replacement.

In order to qualify for the grant, each applicant is required to meet with the grant manager to discuss the project and program requirements. Appointments will be available through January 31, 2014. The next deadline for Exterior Rehabilitation Grant applications is February 28, 2014, at noon.




