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
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

Welcome Back!

t's only the middle of August as I write this, but signs of the end of summer are all around. The temperatures are in the mid 80's when I wake up, the sun is rising later, and I just ran into five Willo neighbors at the grocery store. It's been a long summer and I think most of us will be happy to see it end bringing much cooler weather on the horizon.

As we gather together after our summer hiatus, evidenced by this issue of *Inside Willo* and followed by our Board meeting on September 8th, it's time to catch up on what has happened over the summer. There is a lot of activity around the neighborhood from new street signs along 7th Avenue denoting the travel/turn lanes, to shrinking real estate inventory and forward movement on our streetscape project. We're seeing new development along McDowell at 7th Avenue with at least two new restaurants slated to go in on the Southeast corner and hopefully some new activity on the Northeast corner as that property has

found the right financing to proceed. New signage along 7th avenue will hopefully help drivers navigate the street in morning and afternoon traffic, plus every major intersection from Thomas to Camelback now have turn arrows. Our real estate market has gone down to as little as 12 homes for sale in Willo at one point, making it difficult for buyers but a nicer market for sellers. Hopefully a lack of inventory will help raise our home values. We've also just passed our first "anniversary" since our move into the Squaw Peak Police Precinct, now known as Mountain View. As previously noted, the original transition was seamless, our crime rates have consistently dropped, and we've gained some great officers in the neighborhood. We do have a new Commander, Glenn Gardner who will join us at our September meeting.

Coming up, watch for updates on our streetscape project breaking ground and our fall yard sale and GAIN Event. Also, on October 15 we'll have movie night in the park and more. Until then, see you 'round the hood.

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HELP US Control the Feral Cat Population in Willo

ach street in Willo have them - neighbor cats living under our homes. in the alleys, in our yards, that don't seem to belong to anyone. They just live on our streets and are fed by the generosity of residents. You may be bothered by our four legged neighbors, but they add great value to our neighborhood by helping us control the rodent population, and by nature, they "stake out" their territory and keep out other feral cats from coming onto the Willo street they occupy.

It is important for neighbors to coexist with our furry neighbors and help the feral cats live healthy and happily by controlling their population through spay/neutering.

Professionals illustrate that as feral cats reproduce- sometimes up to 12 new kittens per vear from one cat, the food supply they compete for demises, so many go undernourished. Additionally, with more and more cats concentrated in one location, disease and competition become a negative issue. Taking the time to spay/neuter the existing feral cats that are living in Willo will help us control other cats from coming into our neighborhood, will stop the number of feral cats in Willo from increasing, assuring that the current cats live a healthier life.

Thankfully the Willo Board appreciates that as a neighborhood, we need to help neighbors address and control our feral cat population, and have approved a pilot program that partners with the Animal Defense League of Arizona's "Trap, Neuter, Return" (TNR hotline) program. TNR contracts with Valley Veterinarians to provide, at cost, spay and neuter surgeries for feral cats.

"The key to the success of this program is not unlike the key to a successful Block Watch program-neighborhood involvement. Willo neighbors who get involved will be the ones to keep an "eye" on our neighborhood cats, and if they recognize a new cat to the area, they would notify a contact person in the neighborhood who can help to get this cat trapped and neutered or spayed," said a Willo resident.

To participate, Willo neighbors should contract the Trap, Neuter, Return at (602) 265-7729, or contact Karen with TNR directly at KAnderson@ADLAZ.org to make an appointment with a local, participating Veterinarians for spay/ neuter surgery. The TNR also have traps available for loan to neighbors. The Willo neighbor will have to provide a Willo address to TNR and be willing to trap and bring the cat(s) into the Vet for the surgery. You will also be required to return the cat to the neighborhood where it was captured after surgery. The costs for the surgeries will be covered by the Willo neighborhood - at no cost to the Willo neighbor.

If we spay/neuter the feral cats that currently live in Willo, and return them to our neighborhood after surgery, they will continue to live in Willo, helping us deter rodent overpopulation and will STOP the continuous birth of homeless kittens.

Willo neighbor, Yvonne Anderson will be hosting an open house in her home on Tuesday, September 27th 7:00 pm, 62 W Encanto Blvd., where representatives from the Animal Defense League's Spav/Neuter program will be on hand to answer questions about the hotline, how to trap feral cats prior to surgery and how the group is working to reduce the number of cats living on the street. All neighbors are welcome; please let Yvonne know you are coming at vvonne.anderson@cox.net.

Feral Cats

t is no surprise to most of us who live in the Willo neighborhood that we coexist with a feral cat population. A feral cat s a free roaming domestic cat that was never socialized by a human or a cat who was once domestic, but who has been out on the streets for so long that they have become feral. Whether you like cats or not, the fact is, cats have lived in this neighborhood for years and years. And they will continue to live in this neighborhood, regardless of whether some people choose to euthanize ones that they find, or in worst case scenarios, poison them. This will never eliminate a feral cat population from this neighborhood for two reasons. The first reason is that as long as there is a continuing food source, such as the neighbors who choose to put out food for cats, new cats will always come into the neighborhood. And secondly, many neighbors have "pet" cats who they allow to free roam, and who they feed outside. These cats may also contribute to the cat population in the neighborhood if they are not spayed/neutered and their litters may be free to roam about as well.

The most effective strategy to control a cat population is the practice of Trap/ Neuter/Spay (TNR). The objective of this process is to humanely trap the cats, have them altered so that they do not reproduce and release them back to where they were when they were found. Experts in the field of animal behavior remind us that altered cats greatly minimize unwanted behaviors such as spraying, vocalizing, and fighting. They are also very useful in keeping roof rats at bay.

◆ After 24 hours, return altered feral cats to the street/ Willo location where they previously lived.

A Cool Yard Gives Off SERENE Vibe

arla Panich and Mary Temm at 306 W. Virginia, have a yard that is a breath of "cool" air _ in the dead of

summer. It is astonishing that a yard can look so perfect in this kind of heat. As you stand on the sidewalk admiring the yard, you forget for a moment that it is 108 degrees as the Zen feel draws you in. Karla and Mary have been Willo homeowners for 17 years and had dreams of re-landscaping the front yard but struggled with how to incorporate two 30' foot Ash trees into that vision. Sadly the "Great WIllo Storm of 2008" provided them with a clean slate as the high winds were too much for the trees to bare. With the help of Joe Cascio of Cascio Dezine Solutions, they began a



quest to create an inviting and visually appealing front yard by carefully selecting trees that provide shade such as the Tipuana tipu tree which blooms apricot yellow flowers and is a fast grower. They added a color variation with a Fruitless Plumb tree known to grow a dense symmetrical canopy making a great accent plant. They began by adding a slow winding sidewalk curving it to the left to an elevated patio that just begs to be visited. The yard has nice sloping berms with low perfectly round bushes in all the right places, along with flowering orange lantana and soft ornamental grasses. There was one particular trouble spot that would not allow a plant to thrive, so putting their artistic thinking caps on, and with a little hunting, they found a lovely cactus sculpture that sealed the deal and added the final unique touch to the yard. Lighting was a must and in the evenings the whole yard gives off a soft glow. In the cooler months Karla and Mary enjoy morning coffee on the patio, sipping wine there in the afternoon or just chatting with the neighbors. So if you see them hanging out on the patio stop by and say hi. 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

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

id you know that the City of Phoenixhas provided its approval for

the Willo Neighborhood Association to move forward with its Streetscape Improvement Plan on 3rd and 5th Avenue at Edgemont? As a new board member and chairman of the Streetscape Improvement Project I have been asked by the board to solicit bids and make my recommendation in selection of a contractor for this project. In doing so I wanted to invite you to attend the September board meeting to learn more about the project and ask any questions you may have pertaining to it.

If you have lived in the Willo for sometime, you are no doubt familiar with this project as it has been a topic of discussion for well over six years. The Streetscape Improvement project will provide numerous benefits to the area including additional shade and traffic calming. It will also serve as a nice transition as you enter and exit the neighborhood from Thomas. The architectural rendering will provide perspective on the size and location of the area's affected.

As for the project, the 3rd Avenue plan will add small islands just north of Edgemont on both the east and west side of the street while the 5th AvImproving 3rd and 5th Avenues Greg Corns (Granada)

enue project will only effect the west side of the street at Edgemont. The landscaping for both projects will include trees, shrubs, and other assorted ground plants. The base material will be a small decomposed granite.

In my meetings with contractors they assure me this is a relatively low profile construction process. Once the work is started the project would be completed in approximately 3 weeks. There will be minimal inconvenience as there is not a great deal of trenching, however, like any construction project anticipate barricades around the area for the length of the project.

This project is funded by the Willo Neighborhood Association and in 2006 the board approved \$150,000 toward the project. At the time of approval the Streetscape Improvement Plan incorporated similar islands at the south end of the Willo on 3rd and 5th Avenue's at Almeria. Due to objection by the neighbors in the Almeria area, the project focused on Edgemont only. The approximate total cost to complete the Edgemont phase of this project is \$90,000 (this includes construction and other fees including engineering costs, advertising/ promotional fees, and drawings). Please note the association will assume costs of water while the city will maintain the islands.

Next Steps: I will present my recommendation to the board at the September association meeting. If the board approves, a vote will be taken allowing us to enter into a contract with the chosen construction company. Once a contract is in place and permits have been pulled from the City of Phoenix, I estimate construction could start as early as mid October to the first of November.
