

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
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

# WILLOBOARD & Neighbors Meet With Mayor BY MARILYN RENDON (Cypress)





oard Members Marilyn Rendon, President, Don Vallejo, Vice President, and Linda Doescher, Treasurer, along with your Zoning FAA Sub-Committee Co-Chairs: Opal Wagner and Lisa Solis represented you at a sit-down with Greg Stanton, Mayor of the City of Phoenix on Friday April 17, 2015. Seven other concerned neighbors joined us.

The purpose of the meeting was to find assurances for our Willo Neighbors in regard to the planes flying over homes along with the noise, and other distractions they

create and how to get back to the quiet enjoyment of our homes.

From our discussion we concluded:

- ◆ The Mayor was maintaining confidentiality while the "assigned working group" between the FAA, City Aviation, and the Former Congressman Ed Pastor was attempting to resolve the issue.
- ◆ The conclusion of the "assigned working group" was not productive, good faith negotiations were not present, and it was decided by the City council the City would no longer participate in the working group.
- ◆ The council plans to meet and vote on potential legal actions against the FAA.

- ◆ The City has developed a 6 point plan to address the issue while simultaneously considering legal actions against the FAA.
- ◆ The Mayor feels confident our interests will remain aligned with the City.
- ◆ The Mayor is optimistic the City can bring this to a positive resolution to the satisfaction of our neighborhood.

We very much appreciated the personal access granted to us by the Mayor and his staff which gave us the impression he is sincere in his efforts to resolve this issue. We also established means to continue two-way communication as we will all work together to solve the problem.

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# HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 30th Annual UC Davis Symposium on Aircraft Noice & Air Quality BY OPAL WAGNER (COPORAGE)

Several members of the Willo Neighborhood Association attended the Aircraft Symposium. This is the first of two articles for Inside Willo that will share some of our neighbors' learnings!

The UC Davis Symposium on Aircraft Noise & Air Quality was held in Palm Springs, CA on March 1-4, 2015. The theme was "Shining a Light on Emerging Environmental Policies, Practices and Mitigation in the Era of NextGen." The conference included presentations by academics, aviation industry experts, airport staff, and community groups from around the country affected by aircraft noise and air quality concerns.

Highlights from the conference included:

◆ Legal basis for implementing NextGen procedures without an environmental analysis or public notice.

NextGen, a congressionally-mandated redesign of the national air space, that has been deemed the single most expensive

infrastructure project in U.S. history, was years behind schedule with high cost overruns when the FAA's reauthorization came before Congress in 2012. In order to speed up the implementation of NextGen, Congress included language in the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2012 that established two legislative categorical exclusions (CATEX). Section 213(c)(1) of the Act presumes area navigation (RNAV) procedures to be excluded from normallyrequired environmental studies under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) unless the FAA Administrator determines that extraordinary circumstances exist. Section 213(c)(2) (CATEX2) provides that any performance based navigation (PBN) procedure that would result in reductions in fuel consumption, carbon dioxide emissions and net noise reduction on a per flight basis (moving aircraft noise on to different areas if it can be shown there is a net reduction in the number of people affected by noise) can be granted a CATEX. These CATEX provisions granted the FAA broad and sweeping powers, and they were the basis for the new flight paths here in Phoenix being implemented without notice to the public and without a formal environmental assessment being done. (Note: The FAA Reauthorization Act of 2015 is scheduled to come before Congress in September, 2015. There is a national letter-writing/email campaign to urge members of the House Aviation Subcommittee, to repeal CATEX, CATEX2, and the provision mandating that existing, historic flight paths cannot be used for NextGen.)

n a Special Session on April 16, 2015, the Phoenix City Council addressed the report that it received from the FAA on April 14th on the results of the PBN (performance based navigation) working group that was convened in February. The purpose of the PBN working group is to examine alternatives to the flight path changes at Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport that went into effect on September 18, 2014.

Former Congressman Ed Pastor, who donated his time as the City of Phoenix's representative on the PBN working group, informed the Council and community that the PBN working group did not give consideration to any flight path proposed by the City of Phoenix, including returning to the original route along the Salt River. Congressman Pastor said the FAA gave the PBN working group a very narrow set of restrictions within which they could work, including limiting them to changing the current flight paths no more than 0.3 miles in any direction. Phoenix Aviation Department staff explained that, as a result, none of the alternatives promoted by the PBN working group provided an ac-



ceptable solution for mitigating the noise problems experienced by residents since the new flight paths went into effect.

After hearing from residents of Phoenix's historic districts, Laveen, Paradise Valley, and other areas of Phoenix about noise and other concerns related to the flight paths, the Council unanimously passed a resolution directing that the City of Phoenix:

◆ Discontinue engagement in PBN Work-

ing Group;

- ◆ Renew request to FAA to revert to previous flight paths using new RNAV (area navigation) technology; and
- ◆ Authorize staff to aggressively pursue 6-point strategic framework

Mayor Stanton indicated that the City of Phoenix was weighing its legal options, but said that the Council could not publicly disclose the City's legal strategies at this time.

# Historic DeSoto Building Reopens its Doors as Community Marketplace





he historic DeSoto Building located on Roosevelt and Central Avenue is getting a new lease on life when it reopens on April 11th as DeSoto Central Market. The nearly-90 year-old building has been reimagined and updated with food and socialization in mind. The 17,138 square foot property will retain its Deco-inspired roots housing several restaurants, a coffee shop, a local produce and artisanal market, bar, and a mezzanine level with event and meeting space.

The concept was dreamed up by food enthusiast and DeSoto manager, Shawn Connelly, who felt Downtown Phoenix's time has come for this type of community gathering space, which has proven popular in other cities like San Francisco (Ferry Build-

ing Marketplace), Los Angeles (Grand Central Market), and New York (Chelsea Market). According to Connelly, "Downtown Phoenix has seen tremendous growth recently in all sectors from housing to business, the Roosevelt Row Arts scene to ASU, but it still lacks a central food hub to get the basic grocery goods." He envisions a spot where downtown dwellers can grab a bite, hold a meeting, relax with some music and attend community events — with plans for cooking classes, wine tastings, and much more.

# MYFLORIST8 THE HURLEY BUILDING

Those of you who are new to Willo may wonder why the ornate sign above The Habit on McDowell and 7th Ave. says "My Florist" when no flower shop exists in this small strip center. My Florist opened in 1947 and was the centerpiece of the retail center until 1996 when it finally closed. The flower shop was owned by Vada Pearl Schwartz, a lively and eccentric woman who ran it until her death in 1966. She loved the color purple — so much so that she had a purple Cadillac custom built just for her. Vada was succeeded by her daughter, Norma Brooking, who kept the shop going until her death, at which time the business was taken over by the employees.

Vada commissioned the 3-story purple (of course!) sign from famous Phoenix neon sign designer Glenn Guyette. Guyette is well known around the Valley for signs such as the one atop the Valley National Bank headquarters, the Mr. Lucky's sign on Grand Ave (still standing) and the "Let's Eat!" sign of Bill Johnson's Big Apple on Van Buren Street. According to a recent article on AZCentral, the Big Apple has been purchased by Maricopa Community College District, which will lease the property back to the restaurant (continued on page 23)

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

for up to two years, after which time it will become a parking lot. No mention of the sign's fate.

Just to the west of the 1947-era building housing My Florist is the older Hurley Building, constructed in two parts beginning in 1929 and added to the National Historic Register in 1985. The brick Art Deco building was the first retail center in Phoenix resulting from a new zoning ordinance calling for neighborhood commercial districts at major intersections of what otherwise was a residential area (and at the time, Willo was in the burbs). The Hurley Building was the first commercial center of its kind to offer retail businesses within walking distance of neighborhood homes.

In 1996, both the Hurley and My Florist properties were purchased by a California investment-banker-turned baker named David Lacy who first opened the Willo Bakery, then turned the glass-fronted My Florist building into

My Florist Café and eventually opened an organic grocery as well. The aptly named café was popular with locals and the neighborhood for over a decade until Lacy defaulted on the mortgage and lost the building. After sitting empty for several years, My Florist and The Hurley Building were redeveloped to include The Habit, Potbelly Subs and NYPD Pizza. The locally famous sign was not included in the original redevelopment plan, but residents fought hard to keep

the sign in place. The iconic My Florist sign is a fine example of a vanishing American art form reminiscent of big cars, diners and a time before interstate highways crisscrossed the country.

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


