

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

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Better Safe than Sorry

EXPLOSIVE GAS ALARMS ARE

needed for Willo homes that use natural gas for stoves, water heaters, and furnaces. I will not go into details about smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms, as public service announcements tend to prod us into why we need them. I will say, buy at least two each for your home and make sure that they have a battery backup, if they are hard-wired, or install an additional battery-operated smoke alarm. You don't hear as much about explosive gas alarms, but if you have natural or propane gas appliances such as a stove, oven, water heater, and/or furnace, then you need these alarms in your home.

Natural gas is odorless, so the gas company does put mercaptan (bad perfume) in it so you will 'hopefully' smell a gas leak. Most smoke alarms and CO alarms will not detect natural gas leaks.

If you have gas appliances in your home, purchase explosive gas detector alarms to

keep you and your family safe.

I responded to incidents where people died in home fires where fire alarms were not installed, wiring was disconnected, or batteries not replaced. Defective furnaces killed occupants where CO monitors were not installed. Spend at least \$50 on a wired, battery backup explosive gas alarm. ●



Street Smarts: **Tip of the Month**

DID YOU KNOW THERE IS A

\$189 fine for using an alley for through traffic? Phoenix City code 36-61, which refers to vehicular traffic, says "no person shall use an alley within the city as a thoroughfare...." While the applicability to pedestrians can be questioned, the City of Phoenix prohibits vehicles from using alleys as a means to get from one street to the next. The alleys in Willo are intended for residents' access, trash pickup and utility maintenance. Willo has a significant amount of illegal "cut-through" traffic, especially from 1st Avenue to 3rd Avenue, and during rush hour. These are drivers who are trying to get around the dead-end streets or avoid traffic backups. Most are from the businesses along Central, some are people who are lost, and others are our neighbors looking for shortcuts.

The use of alleys stirs up dust and is unsafe, so please don't use them unless necessary. If you encounter others using them, remind them that there are children playing, pedestrians, and pets, along the sidewalks. Careless driving could have life-changing repercussions.

The speed limit in alleys is 15 mph.

When entering the roadway from an alley or driveway, you must stop before reaching the sidewalk, even if there is no stop sign. The fine is \$189 for failure to stop, and also \$189 for failure to yield. Drivers must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians and approaching vehicles. Look both ways, and be safe! ●

everyone. I hope you enjoyed the holidays and Willo's luminaria. Yes, there were some mixed impressions regarding the big change this year. But before delving into that, I'd like to thank all the block volunteers. Willo had 100% coverage this year. Not one block was dark! And the volunteers did an amazing job after the event.

As you read this, I hope you'll ponder what luminaria means to you. "Why" should the neighborhood do it? "Why" do you enjoy it? "What" would you like your experience to be? survey where I hope you'll contribute thoughtful feedback. Luminaria is for all of us and your input counts!

THE CHANGE MADE: QUALITY AND COSTS

There are 44 blocks in Willo. Each block receives supplies to build 250 luminarias. In November, the Willo board voted to switch from using 3 wax tea lights per bag could be repurposed, but the spent wax tea lights went to a landfill. Since they are contaminated with burnt wicks and wax, they are not recyclable according to City of Phoenix recycling guidelines. Prior to presenting the LEDs to the Board, I had researched how to recycle the CR2032 batteries they use. I learned that any Batteries Plus store in the valley will accept used batteries for recycling free-of-charge. candles each night. Feedback I've seen online from others was they felt it would be worth a "few extra minutes" to light wax lights instead of using the LEDs. But the reality of lighting an entire block is a bigger effort than that. Block captains expressed gratitude at not having to take time off each night to light candles.

Another recurring suggestion I heard from volunteers was to include December

to 1 LED tea light thus replacing 33,000 non-recyclable candles with 11,000 reusable LEDs.

Over the years, the quality of the wax tea lights previously used has declined. In 2017, some only lasted 1.5 hours even though the wax was rated to have a 4-hour burn time. I received complaints and my own testing validated the decline in quality. Additionally, rising costs were a factor. After an extensive search, a reasonably priced, better quality 6-hour burn-rated wax tea light was found. However, it was only 8% cheaper than a reusable LED tea light. By replacing only the batteries in 2019, the neighborhood stands to realize a 32% cost savings. Since the performance of the tea lights was questioned, switching to LEDs seemed to make sense from a cost perspective. Also, LEDs do not pose a fire hazard.

REUSE/RECYCLE

Last year a survey was given out after the event to the 44 volunteers who organized their blocks. They made it clear that going forward a big "why" for them was a desire to make the event more eco-friendly. The paper bags could be recycled and the sand The board considered steps we might take to educate volunteers and residents to ensure the return of LEDs after the event. Several measures were used as each year there are residents who clean up after the event without being involved or informed as a volunteer. Of the 11,000 LED tea lights distributed, Willo got back 10,618 which have been placed into storage for reuse in 2019. I had projected a loss of 8-12% and this represents a 3.5% loss. We also got back unused bags and boxes that will save \$200 next year. Thank you volunteers and neighbors. WELL DONE EVERYONE!

FEEDBACK FROM OTHERS

In collecting the LEDs from block captains after the event, I had the opportunity to speak with many of them. The feedback I heard was they LOVED not having to light 25 in luminaria. Since they wouldn't have to light LEDs, they wouldn't have to leave their family and friends during Christmas dinner. Personally, I love this idea. What do you think?

ONLINE SURVEY

Again, what is your "why"? What would you like to see? This is a holiday tradition to be enjoyed by the entire community that takes real effort to happen.

It seems to me the real question here is: Were the LEDs pleasing enough or was their performance so unacceptable we should switch back to traditional tea lights?

Phoenix Explores Shared Electric Scooters

REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE

Street Transportation Department will present information to Willo residents at the April 11 meeting regarding the city's pilot program allowing use of shared electric scooters (e-scooters) in the downtown area. Street Transportation staff have developed the proposed program requirements based on shared mobility programs from other municipalities and associations. In addition, staff met with various potential e-scooter vendors and City Council Subcommittees to share the proposed policies. The department is now in the process of presenting these proposals to community neighborhood associations to gather additional feedback. At the April 11 meeting, staff will explain what shared e-scooters are, the program's boundary limits, and proposed regulations such as staging locations, parking, and general program requirements.

It will be important to establish metrics and collect data to help determine final policies; therefore, staff will collect data on: ridership trends, number of incidents, completed surveys, number of e-scooter replacements and community feedback. The next steps for the proposed pilot program are: to have council approval to modify an existing ordinance to allow e-scooters and finalize the pilot program permit requirements. Once the pilot program starts, the department will provide a summary to council within the first 3 months. They also have to determine the pilot program term length; it will be either 6 months or 12 months.

Willo residents interested in learning more about e-scooters and/or who wish to provide feedback on e-scooters should plan to attend the meeting on Thursday, April 11. ●

Not only do I like the gourmet pies that you will find at places like Pizzeria Bianco and Pomo Pizzeria, but also the stereotypical pizza with tomato sauce, mozzarella and pepperoni that you can find just about anywhere. I prefer thinner crusts, prefer New York pizza over Chicago style and detest deep dish pizza. "It's not pizza, it's a casserole." -Jon Stewart Locally, I like Bianco, Pomo, Fired Pie and Streets of New York and am not a fan of NYPD Pizza, La Piazza PHX or Forno 301.

zpizza was, for years, my go-to place for everyday pizza, usually delivery. I also make pizza at home, and zpizza was where I bought dough. My favorite thing about zpizza was the crust. I was really disappointed when it closed, and although I knew it had re-opened, I had not been back until I was asked to write this review. That gave me an excuse to order a pizza. Pizza is always a good idea.

I used their online "build your own" pizza. Testing things out I wanted a half "Napoli" -- housemade roasted garlic sauce, mozzarella, roma tomatoes, parmesan, fresh basil -- and half traditional tomato sauce and mozzarella, but the interface gave me a hard time adding pepperoncini. I did my best and at 5:25 hit submit, asking for a 6:30 delivery. Within 5 minutes I got a phone call, where an employee asked to clarify my (admittedly confusing) order. I explained what I was trying to do and got a cheerful "I can absolutely do that". Encouraging.

At 6:22 I got a text from DoorDash that Dasher Keegan was delivering my pizza at 6:29. Encouraging. We live, per Google Maps, a 2 minute drive from zpizza. I'm not

sure what Dasher Keegan was doing for the next 26 minutes but the pizza arrived at 6:48. Sadly, it was cold. Maybe either DoorDash or zpizza should invest in those insulated warming sleeves that places like Domino's use.

There were a lot of positives here. They went the extra mile to make sure that they had my order right, which they did. My dining companion and I both thought the roasted garlic sauce was great. I was less enthused about the tomato sauce but



maybe that was a temperature issue. We differed on the crust. I thought it was as good as ever, she thought it was a little chewy, either undercooked or suffering from the temperature drop. Overall it was a pretty good pizza and worthy of another order.

I missed zpizza and I'm glad that they're back. They're making good pizza and are an asset to the neighborhood. They do have some kinks to work out in their delivery process. Next time, and there will be a next time, I'm trying carry-out. ●

Heard Museum Features Work Influenced by Mexico



the Heard Museum is offering to the Valley with its presentation of Josef Albers in Mexico, organized by the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum in New York, and curated by Lauren Hinkson.

The show opened on February 1, 2019 and will be running through May 27th, 2019. Josef Albers in Mexico is an exhibition that shows the influence and connectivity between the work of Albers (German, 1888-1976), and the abstracted geometric vocabulary of pre-Columbian art, architecture, and material culture.

Albers and his wife, Anni Albers, took frequent trips to Latin America, with particular interest in Mexico – visiting the country more than a dozen times from the 1930s to the 1960s. Josef Albers' fascination with the visual culture of Mexico left an indelible mark on his own artistic production and methodology, with sites like Teotihuacán, Chichén Itza, Monte Albán, and Mitla infiltrating the visual framework of his work.

Included in the exhibition are over 400 works, including rarely seen early paintings by Albers, seminal works like Homage to the



Square and Variant/Adobeseries, works on paper, and a selection of rich photographic and photo-collage work, many of which have never before been on view.

Admission to the Heard Museum is \$18 for Adults, \$15 for Seniors (65+), \$7.50 for children age 6 to 17 and Students (w/ college ID). Admission is free for children 5 and under and for Native Americans (with tribal ID). Free to members.

Free general admission on each First Friday of the month from 6:00 to10:00 p.m.

ZONING UPDATE

♦ A VARIANCE TO INCREASE the maximum letter height of a sign on the south elevation of 2333 N. Central Ave. to 14" (12" maximum allowed) was approved on 2/14/19 with the stipulation that the LED bulbs be limited to a maximum of 3000 Kelvin color temperature. (ZA-12-19-4)

◆ A Certificate of Appropriateness was approved on 2/27/19 for a 646 sq. ft. west side addition at 330 W. Virginia Ave. The project meets historic preservation guidelines and was recommended by Historic Preservation Office staff without stipulations. (HPCA 1800521)

◆ A variance to allow a maximum letter height of 30" for wall signs at 2535 N. Central Ave. (12" maximum allowed) was denied as filed on 2/28/2019. Letter height was limited to 24" and a dimmer switch must be installed to control the brightness of the signs and be dimmed by 10:00 p.m. Applicant shall provide a notarized statement confirming

that 3000 Kelvin color temperature lighting modules were used. (ZA-27-19-4)

◆ A Certificate of Appropriateness for over-height fences and gate after-the-fact and 294 sq. ft. addition to north of existing garage (corner lot) at 333 W. Coronado Rd. was approved with stipulations on 3/6/19: 1) That the fence (approximately 6' 9") and gate (approximately 6' 6") along 5th Avenue, be reduced to 6' in height; 2) That the approximately 7'4" fence at the alley may remain, subject to zoning approval; 3) That the garage addition height be at or below the height of the existing garage (which is 12' at its ridge); 4) That a clear and accurate plan set be submitted for final approval. This will include a clarified roof plan, correct elevation labels, accurate roof heights including that of main house, accurate documentation of wall and gate location along 5th Avenue, and that no curb cut or additional driveway will be poured along 5th Avenue. (HPCA 1700546). The decision was appealed by the applicant

and will be heard by the Historic Preservation Commission on Monday, April 15, 2019 at 5:30 p.m. at the City Council Chambers, 200 W. Jefferson St., Phoenix.

◆ A use permit to install large, bright white 5000K LED signs at the top of the north and south sides of the tower at 2020 N. Central was heard on 3/14/19 and was continued to 5/2/19 at 9:00 a.m. NOTE: The proposed 5000K LEDs for this sign are the same as the BMO Tower signs when they were first installed (before neighbors negotiated a 50% reduction in power to the signs). The proposed 2020 N. Central signs will be visible from many homes and yards on the north and south side of the tower. Anyone with concerns about the signs at this location should plan to attend the hearing on May 2nd. (ZA-53-19-4). ●

This is 'light blight', an 'invasion', a "trespass", & an 'intrusion' to your property. 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
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
