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

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## **5G Willo Update**

#### OVER THE LAST FEW WEEKS, I

have received a several questions regarding "who" decided where the Verizon 5G Small Structures will be placed. The answer is: Verizon.

**The Background:** The State Legislature in 2017 passed House Bill 2365 providing the right to cellular companies to place small cell structures in the City's right of way. This law also limits local governments from enacting zoning laws to prevent 5G structures within their jurisdiction.

**What IS Willo's Role:** Our main effort has been to communicate to residents (oftentimes before Verizon and The City) what the overall plan is with as specific and factual information as possible. Detailed specifics on our collaboration efforts have been communicated in previous articles and posts.

What is NOT Willo's Role: The Neighborhood Association does not, and will not have direct decision-making authority on the specific location of each small cell structure.

**Impacted Residents:** Impacted Willo residents have been notified by Verizon with a contact number for questions. The city of Phoenix contact is Ann Griffin, she is the representative for the City in case anyone has specific questions. (Ann. Griffin@phoenix.gov)

Cooperation: Special thanks to Opal Wagner, and Tom Doescher for working with me along with The City, and to Verizon for being collaborative as we try to balance modern technology with our historical neighborhood. Under normal circumstances, I would have scheduled a Neighborhood meeting on this issue. We are the first historic neighborhood to undergo 5G Small Structure Installation. No "best practices" are available to consider. Please remember many stakeholders are involved in this complicated process from the FCC, State Historic Preservation, and the City of Phoenix. The specific decision on the 5th Coronado small cell structure is still pending. The photos below illustrate the 5 sites where 5G the 5G Structure will be installed in our neighborhood. The first four locations for the 5G Structures are confirmed.

**Conclusion:** We are doing our best to communicate specific, credible, and advance information as listed above and below. Trying to balance the Historical Integrity of our Neighborhood with new technology is a delicate matter, and we are striving to accomplish this balance. As many of our children and workforce are learning and working from home these days, we have wasted no time in getting the issue of 5G to the forefront.

EXACT picture of what will be installed. Using current structure while adding to the top of the pole, and electric box on the ground. Color: brown



**5th Avenue-Evancto Blvd SE corner:** Pole will be moved several feet to appear EXACTLY as the picture shows. Color: metallic as the rest of the poles in that area are metallic.



**SE Corner of Virginia/5th Avenue:** Pole will be moved several feet to appear EXACTLY as the picture Color: brown to blend with the homes on that block.



1st Avenue Encanto Blvd/ Vernon-Alley Structure

will be built from ground up. Picture is EXACT except we have requested no light fixture ... no need to draw attention to the alley as we prefer to reduce alley traffic.



#### Coronado Road/5th

Avenue: As stated earlier, this site is still pending. The picture shown is a possible structure that may be constructed as shown. We are doing our best to move this across to the SE corner of the area, but face multiple challenges with APS, drainage, and easement space.





# Street Smarts Tip of the Month

#### WHEN IS IT GOING TO RAIN?

Soon, Monsoon!

"Weather" you like it or not, summer is here. The National Weather Service outlook gives a 60% chance of a hotter-thannormal summer in Phoenix. We usually see about 110 days a year that hit 100 degrees or more. We hear a lot about the heat, but we also have to watch out for flooding.

We get approximately half of our annual precipitation in central Arizona during the monsoon, or summer rains. "Monsoon" comes from the Arabic waord for season, and it is a reversal of the dry westerly winds that persist from fall through spring and shift to moist southerly winds. While Arizona monsoons are not as powerful or prolonged as those of India, the change in wind direction, intense heat, and increased moisture, bring brief and unpredictable thunderstorms, heavy rain and hail, lightning, high winds, and severe dust storms known as haboobs.

The monsoon storms often cause serious damage as high winds can toss debris around, down trees, damage power lines, and destroy structures.

Old-timers remember the dread of waiting for the first 100 degree day, and similarly, the anticipation of the official start of the monsoon season that used to be determined when there were three consecutive days that the dew point averaged 55 degrees or higher. A hot, dry June would be drenched with a spectacular July storm. In 2008, the National Weather Service designated the monsoon start and end dates as June 15th and September 30th.

Typically, in Arizona, the monsoon season peaks between mid-July to mid-August, but due to the variability in wind patterns and the differential heating of land versus the oceans, it is very difficult to forecast accurately. The wettest season on record was in 1984 when

Arizona received 9.38 inches of rain causing heavy flooding of many roads.

The driest on record was in 1924 when Arizona received only 0.35 inches of rain, resulting in a drought and high hazard for wildfires. According to a recent study from University of Arizona scientists, while the average amount of rainfall remains the same, central and southwestern Arizona are receiving fewer, but more intense, storms than seen 50 years ago.

Flash-flooding occurs in outlying areas due to steep terrain and rapid runoff, and can happen pretty far away from where it is actually raining. Be sure to follow safety advisories and don't try to cross flooded roads or washes. Go to higher ground if you are outdoors.

In the city, flooding occurs in lowlying areas and along roads that have poor drainage. Willo's storm sewer system consists of some interconnected dry wells along 3rd Avenue to store rainwater, and large underground pipes in the rest of Willo that carry the untreated water directly to rivers, washes, and retention basins. This is separate from the sanitary sewer system that goes to the wastewater treatment plants.

Some of Willo's storm system is over 90 years old and more of it was built by the WPA in the 1940s. The old silos made out of brick and mortar are up to 30 feet deep and about 7 or 8 feet in diameter at the bottom. When they fill up after heavy rains, the water backs up causing flooding in the streets and surrounding yards. It can cause a stinky, dirty mess from all of the debris that gets dumped into the gutters.

"EVERYBODY TALKS ABOUT THE WEATHER, BUT NOBODY DOES ANYTHING ABOUT IT." Widely attributed to Mark Twain, but more likely coined by his close friend Charles Dudley Warner in the late 1890s.

#### HERE'S WHAT WE CAN DO ABOUT IT:

Prevent neighborhood flooding by cleaning the storm sewer grates and gutters in the streets. Keep them free of debris from fallen leaves, trash, and grass or weeds. Don't let your landscapers blow dirt and debris into the street. [There is up to a \$250 fine for violating the Leaf Blower Restriction Ordinance P-25.]

Be prepared for summer storms, power outages, and flooding by having extra food, water, flashlights, batteries, ice, sandbags, and phone numbers to call in case of emergencies. The APS power outage Arizona Public Service (APS), call 855-688-2437. Visit APS's Outage Center webpage for more information.

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
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# Kindness Rocks Project


Starting today I invite you to get your art on, have some fun and

#### ON MARCH 7TH AS I OPENED MY

store at 10 a.m., I had no idea it would be the last time for a while ... and still it is yet to be determined how long it will be! Over that weekend I realized the severity of Covid-19 and its potential to harm people and businesses.

My decision was clear: I would close for my customer's and my safety.

I also realized, that although I had a new website that was in infancy, I needed to totally focus on and fill up my website to show as much as possible with the merchandise in my store, and also to be available by emailing customers or speaking over the phone. We, my husband and I, worked hours and hours to photo, model, and list items. We quickly created a new way for our customers to stay in touch and shop. We are now continually updating our

site daily and offering curbside pickup. I can always be reached by the contact email on our site to answer any questions.

Over the following days, one of my customers contacted me to say that she was making masks and was I interested. By this time many artists and designers were making masks and contacting me to purchase from them. I decided to just meet with my customer Angelica. She wanted to be purposeful and productive and I thought I could help people by selling a quality nonmedical mask that was really fun!!! We decide to give it a try.....and ZOOM they took off. They are now available on our website Purplelizardboutique.com under Acessories/Face Masks. They are double layer, great quality, can be washed often. The masks are made one at a time by Angelica, from fun cotton fabrics, and they

are a great buy at \$15. She is now hand beading Virgen de Guadalupe masks which are priced at \$30. We have collaborated to donate batches of 30 masks at a time to Phoenix Children's Hospital.

We feel so very good about donating the masks, since this was always about helping others, not about making money! We are still closed as I don't feel it is time to open yet. The support from the community of many small businesses, like mine, has been a beautiful thing.

Since 1834, Lafayette, our great revolutionary war ally from France has had an American flag flying over his grave 24/7.

Next time I hear from you Bubba, I expect you to know all about flags including how to spell vexillology. If you use the word among your friends, they will think you are really smart. Boring, maybe, but really smart.

And, did you know? The adoration this country has for our flag is not typical of other nations. Perhaps, our long history and military heritage have cemented a special relationship. Generally, though, other countries do not display their banners on homes, cars, and clothes, or in classrooms or churches.

In Willo, one notable non-U.S. flag is the cocktail banner sometimes flown on Monte Vista by residents Sherwin and Joanne. Drinks are always cold so if it's out, stop in and say you are an FOS, "Friend of Stuff."

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## Bridging the Artistic Divide in a Time of Pandemic: A New Online Video Series from Music at Trinity

#### **HOW DOES ONE RESPOND TO**

the cultural realities of a pandemic world? One challenge is to create a sense of community through the admittedly sterile world of technology, virtually our only social and cultural outlet at present. Music at Trinity, the musical outreach arm of Trinity Cathedral in downtown Phoenix, has recently launched a series of short video broadcasts that attempts to bridge this everwidening artistic divide. Our initial series of videos offers to viewers a detailed but nontechnical demonstration of the cathedral's pipe organ. The pipe organ is undoubtedly one of the most misunderstood musical instruments, if for no other reason than "the way it works" is not readily apparent. Honore de Balzac may have said, "The organ is the grandest, the most daring, the most magnificent of all instruments invented by human genius," but for most of us, the actual workings of that "magnificent instrument" remain a dark mystery. Each installment is short (3-5 minutes in length) and will focus on one or two aspects of organ mechanics and sound production. It is a guided tour of sorts, a virtual field trip to blower rooms, organ chambers, pipe chests and the organ console itself. In addition to the mechanical workings of the organ, we will also focus on the tonal aspects of pipe families, illustrating the difference between

a flue and a reed, or a flute, a principal, and a string. And with every episode, there will also be an opportunity for viewers to submit



questions that will be answered in successive installments of the series.

The Trinity Cathedral organ was installed by the Schantz Organ Company of Orreville, Ohio in 2005. The current organ comprises 71 ranks playable on four manuals and pedal and, at a little over 4,100 pipes, is one of the largest organs in the Desert Southwest. Built in the American Classic style, the organ has several notable features, including three high-pressure reeds in the Solo Division, four 32' stops in the pedal division, and an en chamade (horizontally-mounted reed) in the rear gallery.

We are especially pleased to showcase the cathedral organ in this inaugural video series as it was recently rededicated in February 2020 with a celebratory concert played by acclaimed organist Janette Fishell. Unfortunately, with the advent of COVID-19 in mid-March, our spring noontime organ series was cancelled along with the remainder of the Music at Trinity Season, which included concerts by the Phoenix Chorale, Helios, Urban Nocturnes, and Trinity Cathedral Choir.

It is anticipated that as the online video series progresses we will branch out to include episodes that feature members of our resident ensembles and other artists from the larger Phoenix community. We hope that it will become an informative and creative element of the Music at Trinity presence here in Phoenix and invite you to join us online.
