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# Willo Historic Firehouse #8 on Home Tour

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

Built in 1942 and renovated several times, the building has been a single-family residence, a glorified storage unit, office space, and the City of Phoenix Fire Station #8. It was perhaps the city's most unique-looking fire station, and rightly so. All the signs of Mission architecture are in plain sight: a hipped, clay tile roof with exposed rafters; stucco sheathing covering brick walls on a concrete foundation; wood

casement windows; and an offset entry featuring a multiple wood panel door.

The home was the vision of original resident E.B. Smerdon, who lived there from its completion until 1947, when the City of Phoenix converted it to Station #8.

Today the building perfectly represents the need for fire station expansion in the late 40s as the "suburbs" sprouted quickly.

Tim Kovacs is the proud steward of the Willo Historic Firehouse #8. Make sure to visit him on February 18th & 19th as he opens the doors for Home Tour visitors!

# Finding Brass on Painted Hardware

# MANY YEARS AGO, BEFORE

I ever thought about living in a historic home, I was watching an episode of This Old House when they demonstrated a simple method for cleaning years of paint off hardware. I stuck that little nugget in my long-term memory - just in case. Fast forward about 20 years and here I was, faced with a set of hinges with at least 8 coats of paint on them, and I decided to try the This Old House method. Guess what? It worked like a charm! So here is the process for you, along with photos — Enjoy.

STEP 1: Take the hardware off your door. This was not very easy for me since the screw heads were completely filled with paint. I had to use an X-Acto knife and an ice pick to dig the paint out so I could unscrew the hinges.

STEP 2: Find an old sauce pan that you don't mind ruining (something from Goodwill, maybe?) and place the hardware in the pan and cover with water.

STEP 3: Bring water to a low boil and let the hardware "cook" for one to two hours, depending on how much paint is on them. Keep your stove vent on to prevent fumes from filling your house. Check frequently to make sure the water hasn't boiled away, (add more as needed) and when you

see the paint bubbling up on the surface of the metal, it's done.

**STEP 4:** Once cooled, the paint should slip right off the metal. If there are some stubborn areas, put the part back on the stove for additional softening of the paint.

STEP 5: Wipe the hardware clean and let dry. At this point the metal can be cleaned with brass polish, but keep in mind that it will likely never look new again. I liked the antique look, so I didn't attempt any further cleaning.

Important note: Keep in mind that you may be working with lead-based paint. If you do any scraping or sanding, use the wet method so you don't create dust and paint chips. Clean all the residue up with a wet cloth so no dry dust is released into the air. Once you remove all the paint from the hinges, wrap the paint up in a plastic grocery bag and throw it away while it is still wet.

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

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# **Luminaria 2022**

### HALLOWEEN IS GEARING UP.

but it's almost time for Luminaria 2022! THANK YOU to last year's volunteers! The official dates are December 23rd to 25th or 26th, 2022- they may be left out 1 additional day, and supplies are returned 1-2 days later.

Last year everyone received ONLY timer tealights (LEDs) that glow for 6 hours and switch off for 18. Please remember that just because an LED appears to be off does not mean it's actually "OFF". When it's time to return a light, the switch must be slid to the "OFF" position to be off.

Otherwise, the timer runs 'till the battery drains completely. Since new batteries were distributed last year, the plan is to reuse them this year -no battery change! For 2022, new batteries will not be distributed automatically. I'll explain below how volunteers can get new batteries if needed.

We are now seeking additional committee members to guide or assist other block captains as needed and to help with the distribution and collection of supplies For example, we see these people helping other block captains

organize a build party, collaborate with each other, or helping blocks get a captain.

Additionally, we also need help assembling supplies for distribution and help repacking them for their return to storage.For those people who volunteer to help, we will always be available for questions and assistance.
