SOME OLD IDEAS ARE WORTH

reconsidering. Case in point the sleeping porch. A sleeping porch is typically a room, usually located off the back of a house, that is screened on three sides to keep out bugs, and where families would sleep in the heat electric fans and air cooling were widely available, the sleeping porch was no longer a necessity. Families wanting more room enclosed their porches and turned them into a third bedroom. You can usually tell if the small bedroom at the back of the house was is making a comeback. Homeowners can include some sort of outdoor sleeping arrangement in their backyard landscape plans in order to enjoy the lovely weather. You can create one even if you don't have a back porch or balcony by converting a shed into a

of summer. Sometimes they take the form of a second-story balcony off a bedroom. The sleeping porch became a popular feature at the turn of the 20th century as a way to beat the heat and take advantage of fresh air for good health. Medical philosophy of the time held that exposure to fresh air had a positive effect on health, and in the case of tuberculosis, for example, it was actually curative.

Later in the century, when

once a sleeping porch by looking at the walls from the outside you will be able to see the impression of the large openings that made up the porch. This part of the house was also usually built of a different material than the main house and often finished in stucco or wood siding.

I am surprised that I have never seen a historic home in Phoenix with an intact sleeping porch, which I find sad, especially considering that the sleeping porch screened room and adding a daybed or hammock, or even a hanging bed. These rooms can be enjoyed day and night all through our beautiful winters.

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This Plant Stinks, and It's All Over Willo

PIMA COUNTY AND THE Regional Flood Control District want to warn the public about the spread of a noxious and invasive weed species taking root in the community. Mishandling this plant can cause severe breathing problems that may re-

quire hospitalization.

Although humorously named, the stinknet plant is no joke to public health or the environment. Stinknet (*Oncosiphon piluliferum*) can cause severe skin and respiratory allergic reactions and when dry, stinknet burns easily.

Stinknet is a spring blooming annual weed that grows up to two feet in height and emits a pungent odor. It has unique bright yellow ball-shaped flowers.

This plant has been spreading rapidly in both urban and wild areas around Tucson, especially in the Santa

Cruz river areas of Central Tucson. It has overtaken many areas in Phoenix, and can quickly dominate a landscape if not controlled.

We need to get ahead of this plant so we don't end up with the situational nightmare afflicting parts of Phoenix, said Jonathan Horst, Dirctor of Conservation Research at the Tucson Audobon Society.

The dry spring this year has resulted in a modest appearance of stinknet in Tucson area, with

plants restricted to low spots in neighborhoods and other properties, said John Scheuring, Conservation Director of the Arizona Native Plant Society.

Plants are typically more common in low spots in neighborhoods and wash properties.

IF YOU COME ACROSS THE PLANT, DO NOT:

MOW THE PLANT - This will leave seeds viable to germinate the following winter.

BURN THE PLANT - This will increase the risk of wildfires and

TRANSPLANT OR RELOCATE THE PLANT to other areas such as your home or different portions of the river.

DO:

 Use herbicides to kill the plant if it has not yet flowered
Pull and bag the plant, making sure to remove the root system from the ground.

 Wear gloves
when handling the plant to avoid a possible rash.

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Signs of Rats & Tips to Prevent Them

FOLLOWING ARE SOME HINTS that you may have roof rats and some handy tips to prevent and control this pest.

SIGNS OF ROOF RATS:

DROPPINGS: Roof rat droppings are 1/4 to 1/2 inch in length, capsule shaped, with blunt ends. They are usually a shiny black but may vary according to diet. Rat droppings are three times as large as mouse droppings.

TRACKS: Outdoors, the runways of roof rats appear smooth, well packed, and free of vegetation. Indoors, runways appear as clean paths through dust or dirt. Roof rats leave a hind foot track of about 3/4-1 inch. A mouse's tracks will be much shorter. Rats will also drag their tails, leaving a mark between their feet tracks. Grease marks (from the oil and dirt of rats) often appear along walls next to runways.

GNAWING HOLES: Gnawing holes from Roof rats are about 2 inches

or more in diameter and will have rough edges. They prefer gnawing on wood but may also damage property, electrical wiring, and food packaging.

URINE STAINS & ODORS: Rodent urine deposited on rodent runways appear as a line of fine drops or streaks under an ultraviolet flashlight, or black light tool.

SIGHTINGS & SOUNDS: Since rodents nocturnal are and live secretively under normal circumstances, you can be sure that regular daytime rodent sightings indicate а heavy infestation. Various sounds that indicate rodent activity include gnawing, scratching, and digging noises.

CONTROLING ROOF RATS:

Sanitation is the single most important measure of prevention and control in combating any pest or rodent problem. Roof rats must have access to a ready supply of food and water to thrive. To reduce rat populations, try the following sanitation measures:

STORAGE: Store any bulk food items in large metal containers with tight fitting lids, rather than bags or boxes that can easily be gnawed through.

CLUTTER: Remove clutter such as paper and cardboard that rats might use to build their nests. Check the alleys as well. A clean alley w/o any debris is the goal.

VEGETATION: Remove undesirable vegetation around your home such as grass clippings and weeds. Remove any citrus and pomegranates on trees or dropped on ground.

PETS: Keep dog food or other pet food stored in a sealed food storage container overnight.

PEST CONTROL: Personally, I have monthly pest control come to my own house and they installed two poison traps on each side of my property for \$50 each.
