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

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

Lower My Taxes? Sign Me Up!

over the spring and summer, many Willo homeowners got a letter from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) asking for photos of their homes. I got a lot of questions about the letter, and I realized that many homeowners have never seen this request before, but it is a necessary part of maintaining your home's eligibility for the State Historic Property Tax Program (SPT).

SO WHAT IS THE SPT?

The SPT is a reduction of property taxes (up to 45%) for homes that are individually listed on the National Register of Historic Places or are contributing properties in a listed historic district, such as

Willo. If a property qualifies for the tax reduction, the homeowner enters into a 15-year agreement with SHPO that they will maintain the house as a contributor to the neighborhood. SHPO used to ask for photos and a renewal form every two years, but that has changed to every 15 years.

Houses that do not qualify for the tax break include those being used as commercial properties, rentals, those outside of the district's period of significance (for Willo, that is 1910 – 1950), or those that have been altered to the point that they are considered "non-contributors." If you are not sure if your home is a contributor, contact Phoenix Historic Preservation Office to find out.

Contact the Maricopa County Assessor's Office to find out if you have the tax break if you are not sure. Your property should be classified as "non-commercial historic." If you do not have the tax break but think your house may qualify, you can apply for the program by going to azstateparks. com and clicking on the SHPO link under "About." Applications are due by June 30 to qualify for the next tax year.

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
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
