

Preserving the Hotel San Carlos

I AM PRETTY SURE THAT

every Phoenician knows about the Hotel San Carlos on Central and Monroe. Many even know it's haunted, and that mystique lends to its popularity and intrigue. To me, it is a once-grand hotel that has seen better days, but it also has some of its best days ahead. In 2021, long-time owners Gregory and Robert Melikian sold the San Carlos to Rockbridge, an Ohiobased hotel investment firm. The new owners plan an \$80M renovation of the property — more about that in a minute.

The luxurious Hotel San Carlos was built in 1928 and was the first "high rise" hotel with an elevator*, steam heat, and air cooling. It was built at the staggering cost of \$850,000! It had 128 rooms, a pool, and several dining areas, including a tea garden and the famous Palm Room, where guests mingled with local movers and shakers over cocktails. It was the hotel of choice for many celebrities visiting Phoenix, including Marilyn Monroe, Mae West, Clark Gable, Humphrey Bogart, and Gene Autry, among others.

The hauntings seem to have started right away. The same year it opened, a woman named Leona Jensen jumped off the roof in an evening gown. It is debated whether she committed suicide or was pushed, but a woman in a white dress has been "seen" in the hotel since. Other spirits frequent hotel, including several children who are believed to have been students at Phoenix's first school, which was previously on the site. The children include a young girl seen crying for her mother and three boys who cause mischief. The girl may have died during the Spanish Flu epidemic, and the boys, it is believed, fell into the well on the property (which is still in the basement of the hotel) when they were trying to retrieve the ball they were playing with. These days, many people stay at the San Carlos to catch a glimpse of the ghosts and enjoy the shabby chic vibe of this once-elegant hotel.

Now to the hotel's future! Its new owner, Rockbridge, has renovated historic hotels across the US in cities such as Louisville, St. Louis, Knoxville, Philadelphia, Indianapolis, and Portland. Last year, they gave a presentation to the Historic Preservation Commission and showed us examples of past projects and some conceptual drawings for the San Carlos. Those who may want the hotel returned to its original look and design will be pleased. Rockbridge applied for a \$500,000 matching grant from the city to make some needed infrastructure repairs and begin returning the facade to its original form. This includes replacing ALL

the windows in the building, recreating the historic storefronts on the main lobby level, and reversing some non-historic changes made to the Monroe side of the building.

There are also plans to re-open the tea court, which was closed off years ago, and the Palm Room and to add a speakeasy in the basement next to that original well I mentioned above, as well as a lobby bar. They will also add 13 new guest rooms, 5,000 square feet of meeting space, a new pool, and other rooftop amenities. Inside, it will look like a modern boutique hotel. If you like it as it is now, filled with antiques, you may be a little disappointed. But the renovation, scheduled to be finished in 2025, will turn the San Carlos from a shabby chic hotel frequented primarily by ghost hunters into a hip destination for travelers and locals alike.

*You may want to argue that the Westward Ho was the first highrise hotel with elevators, but the San Carlos beat it by only months due to delays in the construction schedule of Westward Ho.

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Short Term Rentals

IF YOU HAVE A SHORT-TERM

Rental or are thinking about it, the City of Phoenix has revised its requirements...

The City now requires annual permits for all existing and new Short-Term Rentals. The permits require the owner/agent/representative to notify all adjacent neighbors as well as the neighborhood association. Also, there must be a sign with the name, phone number, and email address of the owner/agent/representative posted within 10 feet of the main entrance. There are some potentially large fines for non-compliance.

STEPS TO OBTAIN AN OPERATING PERMIT FOR A SHORT-TERM RENTAL (STR) FROM THE CITY OF PHOENIX

STEP 1: GET A TRANSACTION PRIVILEGE TAX (TPT) LICENSE

- Go to aztaxes.gov
- Under "Businesses" click on
- "Login to AZ State Taxes"
- Set up an account
- Once you are logged in, click on "Business Registration" and "Register a New Business Follow the steps to set up your business account
- You will receive your TPT Lic# once you submit the application

Now that you have the TPT license number, you can apply for the operating permit.

STEP 2: APPLY FOR THE OPERATING PERMIT

- Go to shapephx.phoenix.gov/s/
- Click on "Apply for New Operating Permit"
- Sign in or set up an account

 Follow the steps to apply for the permit

STEP 3: FILL OUT FORMS, SEND YOUR LETTERS

- Download all the forms required by the city for the permit
- Fill them out and have them notarized
- Send the form letter by certified mail to all residents within a 600 ft radius keep in mind that the post office will only process 15 certified letters at a time unless you make an appointment
- Scan in all the documents and the receipts for the letters
 Upload them to the Shape PHX portal
- Pay your fee (\$250)

The permit will be emailed to you within a day or two. Hang it as instructed.



Stinknet

STINKNET (ONCOSIPHON pilluliferum), aka Globe

chamomile, is an invasive weed from South Africa that is spreading throughout central and southern Arizona. Its bright yellow flowers may look pretty, but this plant has devastating effects on the desert ecosystem, with the power to outcompete native spring wildflowers. It also appears in neighborhoods, including Willo in recent years. Stinknet especially thrives following wet winters like we've experienced this year.

Declared an Arizona state Noxious Weed in 2020, stinknet's name reflects the pungent odor released from crushed foliage. It has also been linked to contact dermatitis and respiratory distress, so wear gloves (and perhaps a mask) when you remove plants around your property or neighborhood. When it dries out

in the summer, it becomes highly flammable brush topped by seed heads (dried flowers). When the seed heads break up, tiny seeds spread on wind, animals, people and vehicles. The dried plant becomes a fire risk with caustic smoke that presents a public health hazard.

Stinknet plants can easily be spotted in spring, as the flowers resemble little yellow lollipops. In Arizona, it germinates from November-April and flowers from February-June. If it grows on your property, take action to remove and dispose of the plants before the seeds ripen and have a chance to spread.

WHAT TO DO

- Eliminate stinknet asap after it emerges; do not let it flower.
- Pull the plant by hand or with a shovel, making sure to remove

the roots from the ground. Since it can cause allergic reactions and rash, wear gloves, long sleeves and long pants.

- Use herbicides to kill the plant if it has not yet flowered. A variety of herbicides, including glyphosate and pre-emergents, are effective.
- Have an annual management plan to find and remove young plants before they grow seeds.
- Remove and bag dried/dead stinknet carefully - it will shed thousands of seeds, which can live in soil up to five years. Bag the weeds carefully, clean shoes, clothing, and equipment to prevent spread of seeds.
- Do not use a mower or string trimmer; plants may grow back and will leave seeds to germinate the following year.
- Brush off clothing and shoes after hiking in stinknet areas.
- Do not allow pets to run through stinknet. Clean them off if they do.
