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

We enjoyed a great European trip with our neighbors, visiting Paris, Barcelona, Cádiz, Lisbon, Porto, and Tangier. While the temperatures were cooler, the humidity made up for it. It was a good time for all, and we represented West Monte Vista and Willo.

As usual, we put this September issue together in mid to late July, so if things seem a little dated, it's because of other vacations in August!

Although it's been "a long time coming," 3rd Avenue has progressed slowly but surely, and by the time you read this, I hope it's completely done. 5th Avenue is also showing some progress, but it's difficult to project what will happen by September. Thank you all for your patience; this almost eight-year project's completion is close.

We have enjoyed having our monthly board members while supporting a local restaurant, Oven + Vine. When we switched from Dial/Viad/BMO in November of 2023, our attendance was small, and a large meeting facility that didn't meet our needs wasn't necessary. Our board member Lara Sands has some new options for us, and hopefully, a decision can be made by mid-August. The City of Phoenix has voted to expand its Central Business District, leaving the northern boundary at McDowell and stretching the southern boundary to Broadway. Around our area, it's between 7th Street and 19th Avenue, but the zone gets wider further south. In itself, this is not a danger to Willo. However, two bills have been passed in the AZ legislature that actually take away the city's zoning powers. According to my discussion with Phoenix Planning and Development Director Josh Bednarek, it could potentially negatively impact Phoenix's historic districts. I'm hoping another legislature will review this and protect our homes and history.

## Old Buildings Want YOU! (To Get Involved in Historic Preservation) BY TRICIA AMATO (LEWIS)

#### HAS IT COOLED OFF AT ALL?

When I wrote this article in July, it was 118°, and we were all hiding in our houses or pools (at least those of us who had not left town). Now that cooler weather is here, maybe it's time to think about getting involved!

Recently a young person started attending the has city's Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) meetings and chastising the Commission because we are old and don't, in their mind, do enough outreach to get more young people involved in historic preservation (HP). At first, I was annoyed, but the more I listened to this person, the more I have come to think that they have a point. Preservation efforts are most successful when the whole community works together for a desired result.

My articles for Inside Willo are a form of outreach because I am trying to keep everyone informed on what is happening in preservation that affects Willo residents. But we can all do more. And we need to. There have been a number of high-profile cases lately that will be devastating for Phoenix if the buildings are torn down. These include White Gates and Mystery Castle, both of which I wrote about in previous issues of our newsletter. They have

yet to be settled in a way that guarantees the buildings will be saved. More people being involved means more pressure on our city officials and property owners to "do the right thing" for HP.

So, how can you get involved? The most obvious way is to attend the HPC meetings, which are held on the third Monday of each month at 4:30pm in the City Council Chambers, with a virtual option available. To find out about upcoming meetings, go to phoenix.gov/cityclerk/publicmeetings, where you can also find meeting dates and agendas for HP hearings, zoning adjustments, and the Encanto Village Planning Committee\* meetings.

Another great resource for everything HP is the Arizona Preservation Foundation, statewide organization that works with local, state, and national partners to promote and protect Arizona's historic resources. They organize a yearly conference Preserve AZ that is open to the public (next year, it will be right here in Phoenix!) and host a number of events related to historic preservation.

Do you like mid-century modern (MCM) architecture? Modern Phoenix is an activist website dedicated to all things



MCM in Phoenix and advocates for preserving our modern treasures. Each year, they organize Modern Phoenix Week, which includes a tour of MCM homes and a week of lectures, movie screenings, and exhibits.

Or, maybe Art Deco is more your style? If so, the Phoenix Art Deco Society is your place for information and events.

Do you want to save vintage signage? Then, the Arizona Vintage Sign Coalition is for you!

The chart on the next page lists these organizations and more. Consider getting involved to help preserve our historic homes, buildings, and spaces.

## Marilyn Esteves Rendón: Good Times & Tough Battles to Keep Willo Historic

#### MARILYN ESTEVES RENDÓN

has been a prominent figure in Willo's history since she moved here in 1970. She has lived in five houses in the area and currently resides on W. Cypress, where she has lived for 25 years. Marilyn's contributions to the community include serving as the former President of the Willo Neighborhood Association Board. Amongst other achievements, she was at the forefront of the community's efforts in challenging the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and Arizona Public Service (APS), resulting in favorable settlements for Willo.

## UPFROMTHE ASHES

Marilyn's current home on Cypress was built by her father in 1999 after the previous house had burned down to the footings. His construction company designed and built a classic ranch with a huge backyard.

## COLORFUL WILLO

When Marilyn first moved into the neighborhood, her neighbors were hippies, eccentric types, aging celebrities, and older residents with houses needing repair. Marilyn recalls many 1970s-era parties hosted by this diverse mix of neighbors that usually went on late into the night. The events of the previous evening were never discussed the next day...

Over the years, several celebrities called Willo home. Aquanetta, the 'Venezuelan Volcano' and B-movie actress, lived in the neighborhood with her third husband, Jack Ross, who unsuccessfully ran for governor in 1970 and 1974. Nick Nolte briefly resided at the house on the northwest corner of Virginia and 3rd Avenue. Frank Lloyd Wright rented a house on the north side of Almeria and First Avenue when the neighborhood was new. Another notable celebrity from Willo is

Aidy Bryant, an actress on Saturday Night Live, who grew up in the neighborhood in the 90s and discovered her passion for acting while attending Xavier Preparatory Academy in Phoenix. Also, more recently, Frankie Muniz lived quietly on 1st Avenue and Palm. His cat once turned on the bathroom faucet while he was on vacation, causing the house to flood!

## **CFI FBRATIONS**

Willo residents came together to celebrate Pope John Paul II's visit to Phoenix in September 1987. They spruced up their gardens and properties for the occasion as the Pope was driven on Central Avenue in his Popemobile.

As a matter of fact, before the Light Rail, all parades came down Central Avenue. There was one time that Marilyn remembers using a large piece of elephant dung to fertilize her garden. An elephant taking a break during a parade down Central Avenue



left it in her front yard when the Ringling Brothers visited the Coliseum for one of their annual visits.

## ACHANGING WILLO

Growing up in Willo, Marilyn has seen the neighborhood evolve. Throughout the years, she has witnessed the community come together to support their neighbors during difficult times: the AIDS crisis of the late 1980s and 1990s, which devastated some families in the neighborhood, economic recessions in the late 1980s, the great recession in 2008, and the COVID-19 pandemic. The community has always been supportive.

In the late 70s and early 80s, high-rise development led to the demolition of numerous homes in Willo and Central Avenue mansions, causing significant concern among the residents. The construction of I-10 and the Deck Park Tunnel cut the area in half. Entire streets of homes and other buildings were torn down on Latham and Moreland Streets, from 7th Street to 7th Avenue, at least 20 blocks where 2,000+ structures were torn down, and thousands of people were displaced. This event was the catalyst for the historic preservation movement in Phoenix; Neighborhoods came together with the City to save what was left of the historic neighborhoods.

## THE WILLO CONSERVATION PLAN

The establishment of the Willo Historic District and the implementation of the Conservation Plan in 1987 further strengthened Willo. Marilyn was influential and played a crucial role in advocating for the preservation of Willo as a historic neighborhood, protecting it from inappropriate development.

She contributed significantly to the neighborhood as the Editor of *Inside Willo* Magazine, Chair of the Luminaria and Block Watch committees, and notably as WNA Board Vice-President from 2013-2015, and Board President from 2015 to 2017.

## WORKING WITH THE FAA AND APS

In 2014, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) allowed airlines to change their flight paths by using the airspace over Phoenix's historic neighborhoods as a shortcut. This caused irritation and distress among many residents. Marilyn took action by organizing neighbors from Encanto-Palmcroft, FQ Story, Coronado, Woodland, and Willo and hiring attorney Terry Goddard to challenge the FAA in the legal case, "Historic Neighborhood Petitioners vs. FAA et al." The court ruled in favor of Willo and the other historic neighborhoods on August 29, 2017. The flight paths were returned to their original course in March 2018 as part of a settlement agreement between the FAA, the City of Phoenix, and the historic neighborhoods. Despite over 30 citizen lawsuits against the FAA in the past few decades, only three

have been successful, with Willo and other historic Phoenix neighborhoods being among them. We couldn't have won the FAA case without the total backing of the City of Phoenix, Sky Harbor's leadership, and the other historic neighborhoods. Marilyn successfully brought all of those people together to tackle the problem.

In 2016, the Arizona Public Service (APS) planned to build a power substation on a vacant lot on 1st Avenue between Cambridge and Virginia. Coincidentally, the same lot had been the site of a mass demolition in the 1980s. Marilyn rallied the neighborhood to oppose it; it took only three days to gather 600 neighbors in opposition. The WNA, once again, hired an attorney who determined the lot's footprint was too small for the substation APS was proposing. After much correspondence, meetings, and negotiations, the APS executives were persuaded by the WNA to abandon the project, find a more suitable location for the substation, and sell the lot to a developer.

After both these successes, Willo celebrated! The neighbors, known for their love of a good party, found even more reasons to come together. The monthly Happy Hours, the Luminaria-building parties, and the Home Tour planning gatherings were all infused with a renewed sense of pride and accomplishment.

These and other hard-won victories serve as a testament to Willo's willingness to work with our federal and local governments and local businesses to find solutions that work best for Willo residents and the community as a whole.



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## Block Watch News Summer 2024

attended Block Watch/Kid's Club event on June 8th at Walton Park. All the participants in the scavenger hunt took home some cool reflective safety gear, dusk-to-dawn light bulbs (they come on automatically when it gets dark!), and/ or bike lights. We also enjoyed ice cream, all courtesy of the City of Phoenix Block Watch grant program and the Willo Neighborhood Association.

## IN OTHER NEWS:

- ▶ June 7th: the backyard gate of a home on the 300 block of Cambridge was pried open during the mid-morning hours. Fortunately, nothing was stolen. The owners were home at the time but did not hear anything, and nobody came forward with information.
- ▶June 14th: the block captain informed me of a vehicle regularly parked illegally in the fire lane at the east end of the 100 block of Vernon. The car's owner appears to live at Tapestry on Central—they park there and walk into the building. After being reported multiple times to the City of Phoenix parking enforcement de-

partment, the issue appears to be resolved at this time.

- ▶ June 23rd: there was an attempted car break-in on the 500 block of Almeria. The block captain and neighbors chased the guy off, but he was soon found and confronted by the car's owner at Habit Burger. (Rather than confronting thieves, please call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151.)
- ▶June 27th: cars were ransacked, and random items were stolen from the 100 block of Vernon and the 500 block of Encanto. It is unknown if the cars were secured.

## REMEMBER ...

Block Watch is ALL of US! Every single resident in Willo! This means that when you see something, YOU are empowered and encouraged to report it. Please use the Willo "Important Numbers" magnets that all residents should have received, and call the appropriate number when you see a crime or safety issue. It's best to report it to your block captain in real-time. The police department doesn't know, for example, that multiple cars were

ransacked unless you report it when it happens to you. Unfortunately, most of the incidents above were not reported to the Police Department.

You may think "I'm not going to bother my block captain because I forgot to lock my car, and it got ransacked; after all, it's my fault!" While being embarrassed is understandable, we are all human, and we've all done it! By reporting it to your captain, when other Willo residents learn of this, they will be extra vigilant in locking their cars and hopefully avoid theft. Furthermore, the police will now be aware that people are ransacking cars in Willo, and they can also be on alert. We are an amazing neighborhood let's help to keep each other safe!

Lastly, we have a new block captain on the 300 block of Cypress: Marty Oyler. Thank you, and welcome, Marty!

## The Willo Historic Home Tour

## HISTORYOFWILLO

Willo was once the epitome of suburbia: a collection of subdivisions on the outskirts of the small but thriving Phoenix metropolis. This charming neighborhood is nestled between 1st and 7th Avenues, north of McDowell Road and South of Thomas Road. It features a variety of architectural styles, including Bungalows, Tudor Revival, Greek Revival, Amer-

ican Colonial, Pueblo Revival, and Ranches. Twenty-two separate subdivisions were platted and developed in Willo by various entrepreneurs from the early 1900s to the beginning of World War II.

As Phoenix experienced significant growth, commercial development gradually encroached upon what used to be peaceful suburbs. Over time, due to expansion over the past century, the individual subdivisions were overlooked, and the area merged into one unified whole. In the 1980s, Willo's residents successfully advocated for its designation as a Special Conservation District. This landmark achievement, culminating in the adoption of the Willo Conservation Plan by the City of Phoenix in 1986, secured the neighborhood's historic status and ensured the preservation of its unique charm for future generations to enjoy. ## CHANGES TO BULK TRASH COLLECTION IN SEPTEMBER BY BITSY SUSICH (GRANADA)

#### WILLO HAS ONE MORE OPPORTUNITY

for Bulk Trash alley placement which starts September 7th and collection begins September 16th.

After that you'll no longer have to wait for bulk trash to be picked up quarterly. The change enables residents to have their trash picked up after yard work projects, cleanups or holidays.

Bulk trash will be collected curbside, not in the alleyway. Residents are limited to 10 cubic yards

worth of trash, instead of the previously allotted 20 cubic vards. Scheduled collections start Sept. 30th.

Make appointments starting in late August through the myPHX311 portal, or by calling the Public Works Customer Contact Center at 602-262-6251. Appointments will be available throughout the year except for holiday weeks surrounding Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's.



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
